Our AGM held in Halifax in May 2018, as reported in our Autumn Newsletter, was most enjoyable and productive ... and blessed with really nice weather. The arrangements, hotel and activities all worked smoothly.

The highlight of the year however was the Western European Gathering held in Eastbourne organised by the National Scout and Guide Fellowship UK ( a joint Committee of SAGF and the BP Guild of GB ) in which the SAGF UK Team played a full part in the organisation and running of the Gathering. The Chairman was Allan Page and the Organiser Sue Page, both members of the BP Guild.

At the conference Hotel attendees were welcomed at reception on arrival by Liz Aveston, Muriel Rayner, Jane Wardropper and Margaret McColm. Muriel led morning reflection on the event theme 'Flowering of Friendship' aided by appropriate PowerPoint slides in English and French. Diane Haigh and friends looked after Crafts whilst Jennifer Roberts did badges and Peter Short ran Stampbank. Activity proceeds, plus open collections organised by Liz and Jane all went to the Uganda Shelter Appeal....thanks to everyone who contributed whom I have failed to mention by name. Our appeal for the Refugee Shelter Project closes at the AGM in Bristol so do let us try to add to the €1,000 that we have so far sent to the appeal by **International Scout and Guide Fellowship**.

A pre-dinner 'get to know you' drinks reception was hosted by Muriel for SAGF members and members exchanged ideas on growing and developing ideas for the future of SAGF. **Eastbourne:** Report by members of the Irish contingent reprinted from the ISGF.org website

Eastbourne Trip We started our trip with some flying from Cork and some from Dublin including myself. Everything was in full swing when we arrived as it was a bit later than expected. I was greeted by my friend Jane whom I had met at my first FIGS trip to Slovakia. Throughout the first few days I was constantly surprised by friends I had made on that trip. Our hotel was the Claremont looking directly out on the sea and the pier of Eastbourne. The staff couldn't be nicer, they were lovely and helpful. The food was also in plentiful supply, so much so that some had to request smaller portions. Overall the whole week was very well-structured time wise. We had our opening ceremony on Monday night with a very interesting talk about Eastbourne and the surrounding area. On Tuesday we started with presentations and then had free time after 12 to explore. As we had gotten the itinerary before the trip I had booked a train trip to Hastings which was just down the coast. In the end I didn't get to see the ruins on the hill that I wanted to because of time constraints but I did get to see the old town which was beautiful. And I found an old Girl Guide pin in an antiques store which made my day. The official outing of the week was on Wednesday. I picked the Battle Abbey tour because again I wanted to see old buildings and battle grounds. We had great weather for most of the week which was perfect for tours like the Abbey as it was mainly outside. As we all got an audio guide in the language of our choice for the trip around the abbey grounds and Hastings battle-ground we could all do it at our own pace, also allowing time to explore Battle town, which was a lovely collection of little tearooms and shops. Thursday was another morning of presentations. This time on the different organisations of the countries attending. It was fascinating to hear the different ways they conduct their Fellowships. After this we had more free time which myself and a few others decided to use to explore the Redoubt Fortress down the promenade. Even though most of the place was run by volunteers we had a brilliant tour and lunch beforehand in the café. It was a building well worth seeing just from an architectural point of view, but the tour really made it come to life. The Closing ceremony was held at the end of Thursday to allow people to travel whenever needed the next day. This included Morris dancers which really brought a great end to the whole gathering.

## SAGF Abroad.....

SAGF members also attended a number of European Gatherings and Workshops during the year. Jane Wardropper attended the Nordic Baltic Gathering in Gothenburg, Sweden.....and a small group enjoyed their stay in Athens as the report below shows.

### 16<sup>th</sup> Mediterranean Gathering and the 5<sup>th</sup> Southern Europe Gathering

The 16th Mediterranean Gathering and the 5th Southern Europe Gathering were held from 19-24 October 2018 in Athens, at the Titania Hotel. After that, many participants took a trip to the Peloponnese, based on the city of Kalamata (24-27 October 2018).

Five members of the SAGF UK plus one member of the BP Guild attended this Gathering. There were a total of 297 participants from 17 countries. The hotel was in the middle of Athens and well equipped for this event.

We were informed of the serious pollution problem afflicting our sea and heard about small everyday life ways that each one of us may follow in a common effort to stop, or at least diminish, the perils threatening the Mediterranean with a complete destruction.

Sunday October 21, we were taken 42.195 kilometers from the center of Athens to the Starting Point of the Classical Marathon Run, where many tasted the experience of a mini marathon and were awarded laurel and olive leaves for their participation! (Katharine was our Champion). We ended up at the Training and Camping Center of the Greek Guiding Association, 'Konakia'. This is a true 'back to nature campsite' with primitive facilities. We enjoyed a traditional Greek meal, we sang and we danced. And in the end, we symbolically planted an olive tree, the symbol of "Peace and Friendship", and we sent a message of hope in life, as Konakia is very close to the area devastated by the tremendous fires of July 23rd 2018.

The last morning was dedicated to a monument that for many people was a lifetime dream to visit: the Acropolis and its Museum. An impressive building mimicking the footprint of the Parthenon.

Every evening there was music and dancing - traditional Greek dances from Megara, songs from the Mediterranean by the *Apogeo* Music Ensemble and an international night with many of the participants wearing their traditional national costumes.

The Gathering ended on the evening of October 23 with a party, where live music, singing and dancing prevailed, with everyone merrily taking part with a cheerful mood.

The following day 189 of the participants set off for an unforgettable four-day tour of the Peloponnese with stops in Olympia, Pylos, the Byzantine castle-city of Mystras, Sparta, Ancient Messini and certainly Kalamata, which was our base for the tour. "Fellowship Day" was celebrated in the evening of October 25<sup>th</sup>, on the gorgeous Kalamata beach, with a full moon. Our last stop before farewell was in the beautiful city of Tripoli, the heart of the Peloponnese.

A truly memorable experience and great to renew friendships made at other gathering.

**SCOUT AND GUIDE FELLOWSHIP UK - ANNUAL GATHERING AND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – BRISTOL -  
26/29 April 2019**

The 2019 Annual Gathering incorporating the Annual General Meeting is to take place in the historic City and County of Bristol.

The Annual Meeting is to be held on 27 April 2019 at 11.00.a.m. A buffet lunch will be provided.

The venue for the Meeting is to be John Wesley's Chapel, 'The New Room', Bristol Shopping Quarter, 36 The Horsefair, Bristol BS1 3JE. It was built in 1739 by John Wesley and is the oldest Methodist chapel in the world.

The New Room' itself is located in the heart of Bristol's shopping quarter with pedestrian entrances from both Broadmead and the Horsefair. It is easily accessible using public transport links with local bus services, three Park and Ride services and the Bristol Bus and Coach Station within a three-minute walk of the New Room. Bristol Temple Meads railway station is approximately a 30-minute walk and there is a taxi rank just along from the Horsefair entrance. Although there is no on-site parking at the New Room, there are over 5000 car parking spaces available within a five-minute walk.

After the meeting and on Sunday you will have an opportunity of visiting the many local attractions and explore the area during the weekend.

### **UGANDA EXPEDITION**

David has proposed an expedition in autumn 2019 (Nov) to Uganda and has proposed an exciting itinerary. However his main problem is that he has been unable to get any definite prices for the flights, the safari or transport because of 'brexit' uncertainty and the value of the dollar going up and down like a yo-yo until some settlement emerges, one way or the other.

He has estimated on the high side (hopefully) and quoted in Pounds Sterling. As a regular visitor to that country he has a good idea of local prices and is estimating between £ 2000 -- £2500. for the proposed schedule shown below. It is flexible to give the best value for money and he has not overlooked the possibility of non-UK participants of making and paying for their own travel arrangements to Uganda and only paying for the Uganda programme.
